Groundhog Day

Every year on February 2, a small town in western Pennsylvania becomes the center of the weather-watching universe. That's when Punxsutawney Phil — the world's most famous groundhog — emerges to deliver his much-anticipated Groundhog Day forecast.

Phil resides in Young Township near Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, and serves as the star of the town's annual Groundhog Day celebration. The festivities begin well before sunrise on Gobbler's Knob, a rural spot about two miles southeast of town, where thousands gather for music, food, and a dose of whimsy. According to tradition, if Phil sees his shadow and retreats back into his burrow, winter will linger for six more weeks. If he doesn't, an early spring is on the way.

The event, formally established in 1887, is the most famous of the many Groundhog Day celebrations held across the United States and Canada. Its enduring charm lies in a collective, good-natured suspension of disbelief — including the playful claim that the very same groundhog has been making predictions since the 19th century.

Overseeing the ceremony is the Punxsutawney "Inner Circle," a group of officials easily recognized by their top hats and tuxedos. During the ritual, Phil is lifted from his burrow and, in a language known as "Groundhogese," supposedly communicates his forecast to the Inner Circle's president. Armed with an ancient wood cane — the only known tool capable of translating Groundhogese — the president interprets Phil's message and instructs the vice president to read one of two prepared scrolls:



One predicting six more weeks of winter, the other announcing an early spring. The proclamation is shared with the crowd on Gobbler's Knob and with "phaitphil phollowers" watching live broadcasts around the globe.

When he's not forecasting the weather, Phil lives with his mate, Phyllis, in a climate-controlled environment at the Punxsutawney Memorial Library. In a surprising turn of events, the Inner Circle announced in March 2024 that Phil had fathered two offspring — the first such occurrence in the event's history. Because groundhogs were long thought not to breed in captivity, the news came as a shock. The family is set to move permanently to Gobbler's Knob, though the Inner Circle has made it clear the babies will never inherit Phil's forecasting duties.

Groundhog Day lore insists there is only one true Phil, and that all other weather-predicting groundhogs are mere impostors. According to legend, Phil's remarkable longevity is sustained by annual doses of "groundhog punch," also known as the "elixir of life," served at the fall Groundhog Picnic.

The celebration itself traces its roots to Germanic traditions tied to Candlemas on February 2. In Europe, folklore held that if a hibernating animal cast a shadow on that day, winter would persist. German immigrants brought the custom to Pennsylvania, swapping hedgehogs for the more plentiful groundhog. Phil received his name in 1961, though its origins remain unclear. Some speculate it may be a nod to Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh.

Before 1993, the event drew modest crowds of about 2,000 people. That changed dramatically after the release of the film *Groundhog Day*, which catapulted Punxsutawney into the spotlight and boosted attendance to as many as 20,000 visitors annually. Since 2018, the ceremony has also been streamed online, allowing fans everywhere to take part in this enduring winter ritual.

Whether or not you trust his forecast, Punxsutawney Phil remains a beloved symbol of tradition, community, and a little bit of fun in the heart of winter.

Celebrating Black History Month: Pioneers of Labor & Progress

I Am A Man: Dr. King's Final Stand The Memphis Sanitation Workers Strike of 1968


On February 1, 1968, two Memphis sanitation workers, Echol Cole and Robert Walker, sought shelter from the rain inside a garbage truck. A malfunction caused the truck's compactor to activate, crushing both men to death. They died because the city refused to repair aging equipment and maintained a segregated system that denied Black sanitation workers safe shelter and basic workplace protections afforded to white employees.

Eleven days later, on February 12, more than 1,300 African American sanitation workers walked off the job. They demanded recognition of their union, AFSCME Local 1733, along with fair wages, safer working conditions, and basic human dignity. Many of these men earned so little they qualified for food stamps despite working full-time.

The workers carried signs bearing four simple words that would become one of the most powerful declarations in civil rights history: "I AM A MAN." This phrase directly confronted the racist practice of white people calling adult Black men "boy." It was a demand for recognition, not just as workers, but as human beings.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. came to Memphis on March 18, 1968, addressing a crowd of 25,000 people. He returned on April 3, delivering what would become his final public address, the prophetic "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speech at Mason Temple. The next evening, April 4, Dr. King was assassinated on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel.

Dr. King's death galvanized the nation. Twelve days later, on April 16, the City of Memphis agreed to recognize the union and grant wage increases. The strike's victory proved what Dr. King had always preached: that labor rights and civil rights are inseparable. His final cause was for working people, a legacy every union member carries forward today.

A. Philip Randolph: Father of the Black Labor Movement

Asa Philip Randolph founded the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters in 1925, the first Black led union to win an AFL charter. After years of struggle, the union secured a landmark 1937 contract with Pullman that raised wages, set a 240-hour month, and guaranteed time and a-half overtime.

Randolph's influence extended far beyond the railroads. His pressure on President Franklin D. Roosevelt led to Executive Order 8802 in 1941, banning discrimination in defense industries. He later co-organized the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, bringing 250,000 Americans to the National Mall. In 1964, he received the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Randolph proved that labor rights and civil rights are one and the same struggle.

Hired by NASA's predecessor in 1953, she worked at Langley in a segregated computing unit, navigating a workplace shaped by racial barriers even as her accuracy made her indispensable. Her brilliance could not be ignored.

When astronaut John Glenn prepared for his historic 1962 orbital flight, he made a personal request: "Get the girl to check the numbers." Glenn trusted Johnson's hand-checked calculations over the electronic computers of the time. She later contributed critical trajectory work for Apollo 11's Moon landing and helped guide the Apollo 13 crew safely home. In 2015, Johnson received the Presidential Medal of Freedom, and her story inspired millions through the film *Hidden Figures*. Her legacy reminds us that progress depends on recognizing every worker's contribution



Bayard Rustin: The Architect Behind the Movement

Bayard Rustin was the strategic mastermind who organized some of the most important civil rights events in American history. After studying Gandhi's nonviolent resistance in India, Rustin became Dr. King's mentor, teaching him the tactics that would define the movement. A. Philip Randolph called Rustin "Mr. March-on-Washington" for the way he orchestrated the 1963 March on Washington under intense time pressure, turning a vast coalition into a single, disciplined day of action.

In 1965, Rustin founded the A. Philip Randolph Institute with AFL-CIO support, working to integrate unions and expand African American membership in organized labor. He understood that economic justice and civil rights could not be separated. President Obama posthumously awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2013, recognizing his tireless work connecting workers' rights to the broader struggle for equality.



Katherine Johnson: The Woman Who Launched America to the Moon

Katherine Johnson was a mathematical genius whose calculations helped launch Americans into space and ultimately to the Moon.

If you've experienced a **marriage, divorce, or the death of a spouse**, you may need to update your pension elections.

If you had a marital status change and you wish to cancel the **Surviving Spouse Option ("SSO")** and/or make a new election, follow the applicable steps below:

If your spouse has died and you previously elected the SSO, you may cancel it and have your full monthly pension restored under the single life annuity form. The cancellation takes effect on the first day of the third month after the death certificate is received.

Your HRA card will automatically be loaded with \$1,000.00. If you have lost your HRA card, you can call WEX to request a new one. WEX # 844-440-4300.

Retirees who have Medicare Part B can use their Medicare Part B premiums towards being reimbursed for the \$1000.00 WEX HRA Benefit. You will need the notice that social security sent to you in December 2025 that discusses how much your Medicare Part B premiums cost in 2026.
