





Finding Light in the Darkness: A Journey of Loss, Recovery, and Hope by Mike Jackson

It's crazy how time changes things and how fast your life can be turned upside down.

I never thought I would be able to survive the pain of losing my wife and child. I lost them both to addiction within six months of each other. That same year, I lost my mother on Mother's Day and my best friend just a few weeks later. It felt like my whole world had come crashing down around me, leaving me drowning in a sea of grief and despair.

It was during this dark time in my life that I turned to alcohol and drugs myself as a way to numb the pain. At first, it seemed like the only way to escape the overwhelming sadness that threatened to suffocate me. But soon, I found myself spiraling out of control, unable to cope with the reality of my loss. I say this not for pity or for people to feel sorry for me, but to show that there is light at the end of the tunnel.

The days turned into weeks, and the weeks turned into months. I slowly began to realize that I had a choice to make – I could either let my sorrow consume me, or I could find the strength within myself to keep going.

It wasn't until I hit rock bottom that I finally realized I needed help. With support from my EAP rep and many others, I checked myself into rehab, determined to overcome my addiction and find a way to move forward with my life. It was a long and difficult journey, filled with setbacks and struggles, but I refused to give up.

Through therapy and support from loved ones, I slowly began to rebuild my life. I learned to face my grief head-on, allowing myself to feel the pain and sadness without turning to substances for relief. I found solace in the memories of my wife and child, cherishing the time we had together and finding comfort in the love we shared.

I slowly began to heal. I found a new sense of purpose and meaning in my life. I would love to help others who are struggling with addiction or loss. I would like to be a beacon of hope for those who feel lost and alone, showing them that it is possible to overcome even the darkest of times.

Today, I am grateful for the strength and resilience that carried me through the darkest days of my life. I am no longer defined by my past struggles, but by the courage and determination that allowed me to rise above them. Though I will always carry the pain of losing Paula and Bransyn, I know that they are watching over me, guiding me toward a brighter future.

In the end, I have learned that adversity is not the end of the road, but merely a detour on the journey of life. With faith, perseverance, and love, anything is possible.

Everyone has different battles in life. Mine are no worse than anyone else's. Having gone through the things I have, the one thing I feel that got me through is the fact that there is always someone who has it worse than I do. After many attempts, I'm proud to say I'm over ten months sober. My journey has just begun, but I am very pleased with my life and looking forward to tomorrow.

Life can be hard sometimes, but always know it can and will get better. With the holidays fast approaching, it can be difficult at times. If you or someone you know is going through a struggle, please don't hesitate to reach out to me or someone else. We are blessed here at Local 1166 with resources to help.

However, it wasn't until 1863, during the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday, encouraging Americans to come together in gratitude.

- 1. The First Feast: The original Thanksgiving meal likely included venison, wild fowl, corn, and shellfish—not the turkey and mashed potatoes we enjoy today.
- 2. National Tradition: The first official nationwide Thanksgiving was celebrated on November 26, 1789, after a proclamation by President George Washington.
- 3. Turkey Pardoning: The tradition of "pardoning" a turkey began in 1989 with President George H.W. Bush and continues every year.
- 4. Football and Thanksgiving: The first Thanksgiving football game was played in 1876 between Yale and Princeton, starting a tradition now enjoyed by millions.
- 5. Record-Breaking Meal: Americans eat approximately 46 million turkeys every Thanksgiving, making it the most turkey-centric day of the year!




